Clinical Review for the Generalist Hospice and Palliative Nurse (CHPN)



Course Description

This is a review of the principles and processes of hospice and palliative care: the provision of care for the patient with life-limiting illness. Emphasis is on the physical, psychosocial, emotional and spiritual needs of the patient and family. This is a collaborative process with an interdisciplinary team. The topics are intended to prepare the attendee to succeed in being certified in this specialty. The course is an opportunity to bring expertise to the daily challenges of providing skilled care, pain and symptom management as well as comfort to patients who may be receiving palliative care or end-of-life care and support for the family.
