The Trauma Patient: ED to ICU

Course Description

This program is designed for nurses and other healthcare providers caring for the critically ill, multisystem trauma patient and will provide knowledge regarding mechanisms of injury and apply that knowledge to clinical assessment and management issues. It begins with emergency room admission and will address issues throughout the patient's acute hospitalization. The focus is on major systems involved in trauma and includes specialized areas such as pediatric, elderly and burn traumas.

Program Learning Outcomes

This program prepares the learner to:

- Discuss the mechanism of injury in the following areas: chest, abdomen, brain and spinal cord.
- Describe the physiology of shock and discuss the management of hemorrhagic shock in a multisystem trauma patient.
- Describe the care of special trauma patients including burn, pregnant, elderly and pediatric trauma patients.
- Discuss the psychological component for both the patient and family in regards to a traumatic injury and identify nursing interventions to assist in the psychological healing process.
